Oakwood Investment Policy

This past year, the Finance Committee devoted considerable time to developing an investment policy to guide current and future leaders in the stewardship of Oakwood's financial resources.

The policy, which has been approved by the Finance Committee and Administrative Board, expresses gratitude for Oakwood's financial gifts and establishes a framework for the faithful, prudent, and transparent management of those gifts.

The policy defines the roles and fiduciary responsibilities of the Finance Committee and Administrative Board, requiring decisions to prioritize the church's long-term financial health.

Investments are guided by ethical considerations and risk management principles, avoiding high-risk and value-inconsistent investments such as cryptocurrency and speculative securities. The policy emphasizes diversification, inflation protection, sustainable growth, and preservation of principal.

The policy requires regular monitoring, annual review, and formal approval of any amendments by both the Finance Committee and Administrative Board, ensuring accountability and ongoing alignment with Oakwood's mission and financial needs.

Oakwood Finances

If you were to ask how did Oakwood spend money in 2025 the common answers would be on the children and youth, missions work, or staff salaries and you'd be right; your money was used for those things. Few, if any, would say to keep the lights on, the building warm, the water running, paying for insurance, keeping the building clean, mowing the grass, plowing the snow, or printing the bulletins. Not to mention making repairs that were delayed while we paid our mortgage or using technology that gets more complex and necessary each year. Is it worth it? You bet! We are working to spread the glory of the Lord and bring more souls to Him.

So what have we accomplished this year while spending money on our ministries and infrastructure?

When Rev. Alexis first arrived at Oakwood you probably recall that she held conversations with our congregation to get a "lay of the land". One thing she heard over and over was that we needed more young people. Well this is happening! You can see this on Sunday morning when we have kids during the children's time or Vacation Bible School that attracts neighborhood kids. And we have around 40 children and youth on Wednesday. Willing staff and volunteers make this possible in addition to curriculum and other supplies that will teach all those young people about Jesus. We are planting seeds.

We also give the young people backpacks containing food each Wednesday thanks to the work of the mission committee and other volunteers. In addition, serving a meal on Wednesday draws people into the church. To make that happen, these meals must have people willing to cook and serve, as well as the food, some donated some not. Your gifts enable this ministry.

In the late summer, Caring Hands told us that there are no other food pantries in Pleasant Hill and we learned about the issues of food insecurity in our neighborhood. We decided we could help. So we started the Oakwood free food pantry. We get many food donations from Hy-Vee, Fareway, Caring Hands, Pleasant Hill residents and our congregation. We have volunteers who stock the shelves, greet our shoppers and do clean-up. One week we even had 40 families visit the pantry. Our partnership with Caring Hands is paying dividends, not only through the food pantry, but by helping to support the work that Caring Hands does for people in need.

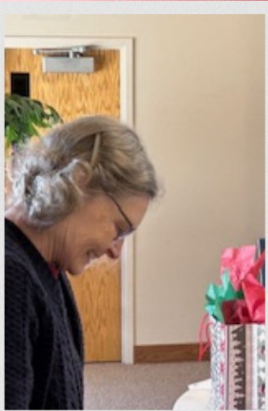
Oakwood also welcomes the community into our church through Boy Scouts and 4-H meetings, quilters, and all who use our building. Some of the groups give us donations, some not, but the goodwill it creates is price-less. The community repays us by supporting our spaghetti supper each year, donating food, coming to our regular and special worship services or asking us to provide a worship service at the Shores once a month, which is another opportunity to serve.

We are so grateful to our congregation for all you have done to make these ministries this successful. Your gifts of time talent and resources show the promise of the Lord in all we do. January does start a new budget year and we thank everyone that has stepped up to give to Oakwood. All the faith you show in what we do here is so appreciated

The Power of Volunteering

You didn't raise me that way," said my oldest, Noah.

He was responding to me saying that I didn't care what he wore to Christmas Eve service. Honestly, I was just so glad he was home in Des Moines and willing to go with me. That comment sparked one of many conversations we've had this year about how he was raised—and why.

Those conversations have come up often, but most frequently when we talk about community.

I intentionally taught all my boys that volunteering and improving our community matters. They were "voluntold" from a pretty young age. They came with me as I volunteered at CAP Theatre and here at church. They helped on Christmas Eve—Noah serving in the food pantry and handing out candles at the 11 p.m. service. Not all my boys respond to volunteering in the same way (Noah is by far the most willing), but all of them were shaped by those experiences.

Recently, I've watched many other parents model that same spirit by bringing their children to volunteer in the food pantry. Some families are from within our church, while others have come from the wider community. I've seen students working toward their high school silver cord and other achievements.

But more important than the recognition, I've watched compassion and empathy grow.

I've seen young people realize they can make an impact beyond themselves. Meeting people from different backgrounds while working toward a common goal can be life-changing—for both the volunteer and the person being helped.

One of the most meaningful lessons my boys learned through volunteering was the importance of standing up for others when necessary. Every person is valued in God's eyes. All three of my children have shared stories of moments when they chose to speak up for someone else.

This year, I asked Noah about one of those moments—why he decided to say something when it would have been easier to stay quiet. His answer humbled me:

"I've watched you do it my whole life, Mom. How could I not?"

As we begin a new year, I am deeply grateful for the food pantry and for the dozens of volunteers who make it possible. I'm blessed by every one of you—and by the people who visit the pantry. Oakwood has raised many of us to answer the call to serve, and I'm thankful to be part of a community that continues to do so whenever and wherever we're needed.
